Year 8 Update

Year 8 have had an incredibly busy and productive term across all subject areas. In English, students have been exploring themes of injustice through their study of Charles Dickens' *Oliver Twist*, while in History they have gained a deeper understanding of World War One, examining how the war was fought and won, including the vital contributions of other nations.

The year group have been particularly hands-on in Technology, creating bean burgers and macaroni cheese in Food Tech, soldering circuits, and crafting pencil boxes and eye masks in resistant materials. Science lessons have taken them from investigating magnets to building their own circuits, complementing their practical work beautifully.

We were delighted that selected students had the opportunity to attend the Science for Schools programme at the Cheltenham Science Festival, which provided an inspiring experience beyond the classroom.

In PE, students have enjoyed a varied programme including rounders, tennis, softball, cricket, and athletics, and in Drama they've been developing their comedy acting skills.

Geography has covered coastal processes, landscapes, and weather and climate systems, while Maths has focused on circumference and angles—with selected students also rising to the challenge of the UK Maths Challenge.

Year 8 also reached an exciting milestone in ICT with their first experience of text-based programming, completed reading and writing assessments in Languages, and explored the work of artist Ian Murphy in Art.

It has been wonderful to see their enthusiasm and progress across such a diverse curriculum.

3G Pitch Update

New 3G Pitch – Access, Expectations & Student Use

We are delighted to open our new 3G pitch for student use from Monday 18th May. This is a fantastic addition to our facilities, and we are confident it will enhance both curriculum and enrichment opportunities for students.

To ensure the pitch remains in excellent condition and can be enjoyed by all we have shared the following information with students during Mentor time. We ask for your support in reinforcing the expectations below.

When Can Students Use the 3G?

Students can only access the 3G at specific times:

- **Lunchtimes (1:25pm – 1:50pm) on a rota basis**
- **Timetabled PE lessons (starting Term 6)**
- **School-run after-school clubs**

The lunchtime rota is:

- Monday – Year 7
- Tuesday – Year 9
- Wednesday – Year 11 & Sixth Form
- Thursday – Year 8
- Friday – Year 10

Footwear Requirements (Essential)

To protect the surface, strict footwear rules apply:

-  Allowed: Moulded or bladed football boots
-  Not allowed: Metal studs or trainers
-  All boots must be clean and checked by staff before entry



3G Pitch Update

Key Student Expectations

To ensure safety and longevity of the facility, when accessing the pitches at lunchtime students must:

- Enter and exit using the designated path only
- Show boots to staff before accessing the pitch
- Leave bags, coats and blazers in the spectator area
- Bring their own football (these are not provided by school)

Rules to Protect the Surface

Students must not:

- Bring food or drink onto the 3G
- Wear inappropriate footwear
- Move goals or damage equipment

Failure to follow these rules will result in loss of access to the facility.

Why These Rules Matter

The 3G pitch is a significant investment for our school and community. The rules are in place to:

- Maintain the quality of the surface
- Ensure safety for all users
- Enable long-term use by students and the wider community

RSC Chemistry Olympiad

On Wednesday 29th April the Yr12 and 13 A Level Chemistry students took part in the RSC Analytical Challenge. This is a national competition where students work in groups to complete a number of analytical tasks to solve a crime.

Not only does it allow them to practise some of the practical skills they have been developing over the last 18 months it helps them work on their problem solving skills. It also gives them an opportunity to spend several hours simultaneously working on an experiment, similar to how they will work in University science labs.

After several hours hard work and some discussion about their results students uploaded them to the portal to be judged by the national panel. It will be several weeks until we find out the winner of both the school and regional competition.

Please congratulate all involved, they showed excellent team work throughout and could be heard enthusiastically debating the chemistry during the event.

Fame Lab Final

The Fame Lab final was held at the Roses Theatre in Tewkesbury on Wednesday 11th of March.

Fame lab is a Gloucestershire wide competition run by Cheltenham Science Festivals. 25 schools took part this year. Year 9 pupils must research, write and perform a 3 minute speech on a STEM subject of their choice. Each school sends a representative to compete at the final to become the Gloucestershire champion.

At Chosen Hill all Yr 9 pupils have been taking part in this competition during their science lessons. They have learned how to use reputable sources for research and cross check details. They learned how to speak with clarity and use words that the audience will understand or that they can pronounce easily. They also learned how to let their passion for their subject shine through as they gave their talk, so that they would keep their audience engaged. Every pupil wrote a 3 minute speech on subjects as wide ranging as 'The superpower of immortality' to 'Dancing to improve mental health.' Each class voted on their speeches and put forward a winner for the in school final that took place on 6th February in the main school hall with 3 judges and a Yr 8 audience.

The Chosen Hill winner from our final was Phoebe who performed a fascinating talk on 'Why humans can't regrow limbs'.



Phoebe then attended 2 days of workshops run by Fame Lab, where she was given advice from science communicators on how to polish her speech to perfection.

She then represented Chosen Hill School in the final at the Roses Theatre.

Competition was fierce, with some buckling under the pressure. Phoebe was last to perform, but she did the school proud. Speaking with confidence, keeping the audience engaged and delivering a masterclass in science communication, Phoebe kept her nerves in check and was a fantastic ambassador for the school.

The standard was incredibly high, and speeches covered 'The safety of F1 cars', 'The physics of making the perfect paper aeroplane', and 'How film producers use sound to make you scared'. The winner entertained the audience with a speech on 'How group theory can solve a Rubik's cube' and finished his speech by solving his Rubik's cube in less than 10 seconds. Congratulations to Phoebe who comes home with a medal and certificate and skills that she will be able to use throughout her schooling and beyond.

Silver DofE Practice Afternoon

Silver DofE Assessed Expedition

Notices

Reporting an Absence

A reminder that all student absences are required to be reported via Class Charts by 8.15am – on each day of absence. This is to ensure that all registers are accurately marked at the start of the school day and you do not receive any un-necessary communication from the school.

If your child is going to be late or has an appointment which means they will be absent from school for a period of time, please also report this via Class Charts. When your child arrives at school they must sign in at reception before going to their appropriate lesson.

If you require your Class Charts code please email office@chosen-hill.gloucs.sch.uk and your code will be issued to you. The parent guide is also available on our website should you require any further help on logging an absence.

Roadworks

Roadworks will begin on the A40 Over Bridge on 29 June, with lane closures, contraflows and reduced speed limits in place until its scheduled finish in March. National Highways will implement traffic management measures in phases to minimise disruption to motorists.

These include:

- June to March 2027: Total closure A417 Over Causeway to A40 Westbound slip road
- June to July 2026: Lane 2 closures in both directions
- July to October 2026: Eastbound carriageway closure with single lane contraflow on the westbound carriageway
- October 2026 to January 2027: Lane 2 closures in both directions
- February to March 2027: Removal of all traffic management
- A 30mph speed limit will be introduced, with overnight closures and diversions also enforced.
