Over fifteen students waited, in uniform, patiently for the parade to begin. Cadet groups from the Army, Marines, Air Force, Scouts and Guides marched in unison, poppies gleaming on their every uniform. Acting Headteacher, Mr Bardgett, delivered a moving speech. He thanked those who weren't there on earth, and expressed the immense pride of the country in what these people had done. The cadets, standing full attention, listened intently and respectfully.



It was then our two-minute silence. We had, in previous assemblies, been encouraged that there was no right or wrong thing to reflect on during this time. For me, it was a time to think about who made the ultimate sacrifice. Who fell and never got up.

After the two minutes of silence, dignitaries from many branches of the military, as well as Mr Bardgett and Year 11 student Ruby Dix, lay their wreaths before the Chosen Hill flag poles. Even the birds seemed to pause in their singing, as if they knew that this was an important occasion.

Year 7 Student Hiranyamayi Dobariya read her competition-winning poem for those gathered and, as emotions ran high, we were reminded that, no matter how long may pass, those who have fallen will never be forgotten. As Hiranyamayi observed:

"We will remember - not in tears,

What's it about? Why do they do it? What's the point? Read on to find out!



VI Form Film Studies Crush CineYouth

A cold, but bright, November day saw a contingent of Chosen Hill VI Form Film-Studies students descend on the University of Gloucestershire's Park Campus, to get up close and personal with some of the nations up and coming Short film makers.

Run by the Cheltenham International Film Festival Ltd, CineYouth is the festival's attempt to get more young people into film. Students from several schools, colleges and the university itself were treated to a showing of 8 short films, broken down into groups of four, with question and answer sessions commencing with the makers of the films that were shown.

Of the eight directors in attendance, students seemed to think several stood out. The first was Susan Wokoma, who has been named a BAFTA Breakthrough Brit. Her film, *Dark Skin Bruises Different* seemed to hit home with many of our students, who in response asked some intuitive questions about her creative process.



Another was Anna Pavlova-Garshyna. Coming from the battle zone of Kharkiv, Ukraine, Anna's personal experience was a revelation for the young people there. Her short film, *Drift*, along with personal testimony to the hardships of filming in, what has now become, a warzone had a serious significance to what is happening in Ukraine today.



John Morrish, MC and co-organiser of the event, seemed particularly happy with the proceedings. "I thought it was resoundingly successful," he said. "Everyone responded brilliantly"

After the main screenings and some intuitive questions posed by our VI Form Students, There was a chance to network and mingle with the

industry professionals.



"If there is one thing I hope the young people took away," said John Morrish, "it's this: *film is not that hard!* You just have to really want to do it, have unstoppable self-confidence, and be prepared to persist."

The Great Gatsby



Blood Brothers



Blood Brothers, written by Willy Russell, is a really emotional and dramatic musical that follows the lives of twin brothers, Mickey and Edward, who are separated at birth and grow up in completely different lives. One is raised in a poor, lower class family and the other in an affluent, middle class one. They are unaware of their true connection but fate brings them together and they form a strong bond, calling themselves 'blood brothers' without realising they actually are. Their innocent friendship as kids makes the story even more intense when we realise how different their futures will be.

The story is really powerful because it shows how class and money can dramatically change a person's life. Our character's friendship starts to change as they get older, we see how their surroundings influence their choices and bring them apart, but in the end their paths always end up crossing, reminding us how strong their connection is. The narrator is always there and reminds the audience that something bad is going to happen and guiding us through the journey.
